2022-23 Opportunities for Parental Involvement

We believe that education is a joint partnership between the school and parents. Our combined responsibility should be one of serving as facilitators to help all children reach their maximum potential. We look forward to and encourage parental involvement as much as possible at Victoria. Some of the ways to become involved include serving on the School Site Council SSC), the English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC), Title I Advisory, and the GATE Committee. Our very active and involved PTA and ELAC bodies offers parents a number of opportunities to make a difference at Victoria. Parents also volunteer in the classrooms, in the library, and at enrichment programming such as Art Masters and Makerspace Lab. We value a team approach and welcome all parent participation.

Parents receive timely information about school curriculum, types of assessments, and district content and performance standards students are expected to meet by attending Back to School Night in the fall and Open House in the spring. Teachers and parents meet formally in November and March during our Parent/Teacher Conference weeks, and discuss each student's academic, social, and emotional progress. More frequent means of communication are achieved via weekly Blackboard bulletin to parents, weekly class communications, Twitter, and Instagram feeds to keep parents up to date on school related events and information. Parents are also encouraged to participate in Family Nights and other school and PTA sponsored events, such as Fall Festival, Spring Fling, Movie Nights, and the annual Jog A Thon. Our additional parent engagement monies have provided us the opportunity to host Coffee With the Principal where topics range from literacy and math to social and emotional issues of our students. These monies have also provided translation at our evening stakeholder meetings to discuss and share our adopted ELA/ELD curriculum, Wonders. As a title I school, the School-Parent Compact is discussed at Back to School Night and sent home with all students for family discussion. Finally, each spring stakeholders from PTA, SSC, ELAC, and school leadership team (SLT) convene for a strategic planning summit where data, surveys, and input are presented to chart the course for school priorities and budgets for the following school year.

We recognize the increased need for Social Emotional support during these challenging times. Therefore, we will hold parent SEL nights that will showcase our behavior specialist, counselor, and principal who have researched the latest best-practices during these isolating times to share out with our parents how they can support their children at home. Our SEL team will create activities that parents can use at home to support the social and emotional needs of their children. Materials will be sent home via digital and hardcopy with students. Both forums will have parent opportunities for Q&A and breakout groups to discuss newly acquired information and to network for support groups during these challenging times.

2022-23 School Safety Plan

State education code requires schools to review and update the Comprehensive School Safety Plan (as needed) at least once each year. These plans must be submitted to the local Board of Education for adoption by March 1st. In Newport-Mesa Unified School District, plans are evaluated and revised October through January, then submitted to the Board of Education in February. By following this cycle, schools open each August with a fully approved Comprehensive School Safety Plan in place for fall-winter and allows for training and adjustments through mid-year. The safety of students and staff is a priority at Victoria School. We accomplish our goals by creating a safe and clean learning environment. Students, staff and parents show a great deal of pride in the school and work hard to maintain an immaculate campus. The campus is inspected daily to ensure the best possible conditions. Victoria has a Safe School/Disaster Preparedness Plan and we conduct regular fire, disaster and intruder drills. The entire staff has been trained by Homeland Security Solutions in Emergency Response Training, and our school team also participated in a one day SERT (School Emergency Response Team) training. We continue to refine our procedures for keeping our campus secure during the school day, including the process of welcoming parents who visit the school, and we continue to work on enhancing safety procedures in our busy parking lot. Furthermore, our fencing in the front of the school was completed in October of 2015, creating a closed campus during the school day. The result has been one entry point for quests to enter campus via the front office. Victoria's school's safety plan was reviewed with staff on December 7th 2021. Newly amended items to our school safety plan include:

- 1. Onboard orientation for all school approved volunteers.
- 2. Revision of our school supervision plan which includes expanded areas of campus and additional staff supervision before. during, and after school to ensure that our students and staff remain safe.
- 3. Staff meeting time will be allocated for staff engagement in table top safety exercises.
- 4. Development, implement, and evaluate our tier I and tier II behavior supports for those students who need the extra support in developing positive behavior and good choices that reflect kindness, courtesy, and respect for themselves and others. Our new counselor and behavior specialist will work with the principal and key stakeholder to identify areas of need and implement targeted supports to improve outcomes. The development of this multi-tiered system of support will target our supports to specific recurring behaviors with our students.

Our safety plan was revised and shared for input with our stakeholder groups (SSC, PTA, and ELAC) on January 21, 2022 and approved by the Local Board of Education on February 8, 2022.
